Our upcoming courses and events include:

Introductory course on knowledge synthesis for knowledge users

Knowledge Synthesis (KS) is a method used to summarize all relevant studies on a specific question. KS provides the evidence base required to create important knowledge translation products, such as policy briefs, clinical practice guidelines, and patient decision aids. As such, KS is the most reliable way to transform research into knowledge that

knowledge user decision-makers – patients, healthcare providers, and policy-makers – can use for decision-making. Offered in partnership with the University of Toronto, this course teaches participants how to conduct KS. At the end of the course, participants will have a protocol for knowledge synthesis on the topic of their choice, with guidance from course instructors.

Who should take this course?

Grad students, post-docs, early career researchers, new evidence synthesis practitioners, other knowledge users*

Course format:

Online, asynchronous. Most of the learning is self-directed, with two 'live' virtual office hours sessions with KS expert Dr. Andrea Tricco (~100 learning hours).

Course dates:

Offered annually from January–April.

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- Formulate a review question
- Develop a review protocol
- Abstract data
- Appraise the quality of studies
- Differentiate between different types of knowledge synthesis

Foundations of Knowledge Translation (KT)

Did you know that it can take up to 17 years to get research evidence into practice? Using knowledge translation (KT)/knowledge mobilization (KM) methods can help reduce this time to practice to as little as three years.

Learn the basics of KT/KM with the Foundations of KT course designed to introduce researchers, practitioners, trainees, and other knowledge users to the science of knowledge translation.

Who should take this course?

Researchers, KT/KM practitioners, grad students, post-docs, other knowledge users

Course format:

Online, asynchronous, self-directed (~30 learning hours).

Course dates:

We can typically offer this course virtually, on-demand for a cohort of 10+ individuals with 60-days' notice.

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- Identify key definitions
- Use theories, models and frameworks for KT activities
- Know what to consider when planning for implementation, evaluation, and sustainability

Practicing KT

Are you implementing a project but not sure where to start? Designing a new programme and wanting to ensure sustainability from the start? This is a professional development course targeted towards programme managers,

healthcare administrators, researchers, research support staff, educators, and more. It will teach participants how to apply KT science to real-world implementation projects in order to enhance and sustain project outcomes.

Who should take this course?

Knowledge users such as programme managers, researchers and educators

Course format:

Online, mix of synchronous and asynchronous sessions with KT experts Drs. Tina Fahim and Sharon Straus (~4 days).

This course is also offered in-person in Toronto (Canada) every two years.

Course dates:

We can typically offer this course virtually, on-demand for a cohort of 10+ individuals with 60-days' notice.

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- Map barriers and facilitators to change, using theories and frameworks
- Systematically select and operationalize implementation strategies to address barriers and facilitators
- Plan for implementation, evaluation, and sustainability
